

Victoria M. Bunsen Memorial Sculpture Garden

Victoria "Vicky" Bunsen worked tirelessly for more than 25 years on the City of Westminster's Staff as its staunchest advocate for historic preservation. Vicky began her career in the City Attorney's Office and later moved into the City's Community Development Department to devote herself full time to advancing the cause of historic preservation in the City.

Vicky was responsible for establishing the City's first urban renewal area and urban renewal project with the redevelopment of the Westminster Plaza Shopping Center at 72nd and Federal Boulevard. This project served a catalyst for significant redevelopment in Historic Westminster and a much broader commitment to historic preservation of the very roots of the City, including the Rodeo Supermarket, the Grange, and the Red and White building.

Art, music and historic preservation were Vicky's greatest passions. Vicky played a key role in the formation of the South Westminster Arts Group and the Historic Westminster Arts District. She could often be seen at the Westminster Grange playing her beloved fiddle with her old-time bluegrass band. Vicky's efforts were not limited to the original area of Westminster. Vicky went on to assure the preservation of The Shoenberg Farm and Dairy, the Semper Family Farm, the Mushroom Farm Water Tower and the Wesley Chapel Pioneer Cemetery.

It can be said that Vicky Bunsen was the City's "Mother of Historic Preservation." Without her devotion, passion and commitment to historic preservation much of the City's historic roots would be lost. Dedicating the Victoria Bunsen Memorial Sculpture Garden and the Fred Valente Humanitarian Park will serve as important and permanent reminders to the citizens of Westminster of the roots from which such a great City grew.

The Vicky Bunsen Sculpture Garden has two permanent sculptures on display and ten pad sites for the Sculpture on Loan program. The permanent sculpture installations include Lady Catrina by Victoria Patty and Patient Warrior by Christopher Romero. Eleven pad sites are available for the Sculpture on Loan program. This program displays sculptures for a limited period of time and brings approximately \$100,000 in valuable art for the enjoyment of those visiting the Vicky Bunsen Sculpture Garden. All selected artists receive a stipend for the period that their sculptures are on loan. The selected sculptures are identified through a national call for entries.

About Victoria Patty

"Victoria's passion for making steel sculptures started after college in her mid-20's when she was hired as an industrial mechanic for the City of Boulder. Soon after being hired she attended welding classes at the local technical college. Learning how to weld opened up a door that would allow Victoria to express herself through steel. She would stay after work to make steel sculptures from the "boneyard" of leftover pump parts. "The pump parts were unique and fun to work with," Victoria remembers, "but I wanted a more delicate finish on my metal pieces. I needed something more feminine to add to them." In 1995, she signed up for a 3-week blacksmithing course taught by Frank Turley in Santa Fe, NM. She said "It brought me to another level with metal. I was drawn to the fluidity and softness of steel after it's heated in a 2000-degree gas forge." There she learned how to make her own tools through blacksmithing practices such as forge welding and tempering as well as the delicate scrolls that "finish" her pieces.

As a sculptor working with steel, her goal is to make this rigid substance appear soft and supple, fluid and dynamic. To enable expressions of textures and curves that invite the touch of a hand. Her techniques are a fusion of both the old world and the new world of metalsmithing. She continues her research and testing of the steel's tolerance to heat and manipulation.

About Sandy Friedman

""The environment of Colorado and the Southwest significantly influences my work. I draw from the energy of the mountains, sky, weather, plains, grasslands, rivers, wetlands and our urban environments. My sculptures represent the energy found in totems and the interaction of the positive and negative spaces created by the sculpture's shapes. These represent moments in time depicted in a static state. My sculpture is positive and reaches out to folks to encourage exploration of thoughts, positive affirmations and general well-being."

From the Artist about "Cloud Cover and Hi Fire Salt Art"

"Cloud Cover is one of my pieces that is produced using the hi fire salt process. Hi-fired salt was discovered in Germany as far back as the 16th Century. The kilns and potteries that were producing utilitarian ware were primarily wood fired. This firing process required a lot of wood. When the forests began to recede from usage it became increasingly more difficult and expensive to obtain the wood necessary for firing. A creative potter realized that there was a lot of driftwood that had accumulated along the shorelines and often it was aged, dried and perfectly cured for wood-fired kiln usage. Potters began using this wood. The side benefit was that it created an attractive pitting that is now termed orange peel on the surface of the pots. Chemically, the sea salt fumes were reacting with the silica sand in the clay body. The higher temperature stoneware resulting from this fuming process was found to be much more impervious and durable to foods and chemicals.

Many folks familiar with old German beer steins, will notice a similar orange peel effect.

"My sculptural and digital photography imagery is a reflection of my past and present forces and the imagination of my life's stories.
